APPELLANT'S RESPONSE TO THE COURT'S MAY 4, 2023 ORDER

The undersigned counsel submits this response to the Court's May 4, 2023 Order, which directed the undersigned to provide a copy of the Appellant's death certificate and show cause why the December 2, 2020 Board of Veterans Appeals (BVA) decision should not be vacated and this appeal dismissed. On July 11, 2023, this Court granted the undersigned counsel's motion to extend time to develop any potential arguments. This response addresses that request and provides those arguments.

Mr. Hunt's death does not moot the issue before this Court and he should be posthumously granted veteran status.

Statutorily, there is precedent for a posthumous acknowledgment of veteran status. The existence of statutes like 38 USC § 5121 (Payment of certain accrued benefits upon death of a beneficiary) and 38 USC § 5121A (Substitution in case of death of claimant) establishes that certain determinations (e.g., veteran status, compensation, pension) can be made even after the death of the veteran. It is important to note that a determination and posthumous acknowledgment of Mr. Hunt's veteran status would *not* entitle his family to any monetary benefits; however, it is no less important for that. Instead, it would affirm and honor the last wishes of a man who fervently fought for his veteran status, not for compensation, but for need-based pension, allowing him access to a significant benefit – burial in a national cemetery.

According to 38 U.S.C. § 2402(a)(1), an individual must be a veteran (or one of a limited number of other individuals; e.g., Reserve or Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) member, spouse or minor child of a veteran, etc.) to be eligible for burial in a national cemetery. 38 U.S.C. § 101(2) is the governing statute and defines a veteran as "a person who served in the active military, naval, air, or space service, and who was discharged or released therefrom under conditions other than dishonorable."

Mr. Hunt meets those requirements. He served in the United States Navy and received a General, Under Honorable Conditions discharge. [Appendix A – DD-214] Additionally, his death certificate shows that Wayne Robert Hunt was laid to rest on November 3, 2022 and is interred in the Massachusetts National Cemetery in Bourne, Massachusetts, a cemetery that is under the jurisdiction of the NCA. [Appendix B – Wayne Hunt's Death Certificate] The National Cemetery Administration (NCA) acknowledged Wayne Hunt's veteran status by authorizing his burial in a national cemetery.

This later interment conflicts with the earlier Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA) decision, which determined that Mr. Hunt was ineligible for VA pension as a result of his military separation, despite his General, Under Honorable Conditions

discharge. The VBA denied, and the BVA affirmed, Mr. Hunt need-based pension, reasoning that he was barred because he was discharged by reason of court-martial. As we argued in our Brief, filed December 14, 2022, we do not believe this to be the case.

By regulation, the Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA) is responsible for making determinations for requests pertaining to decedents "whose character of discharge may potentially bar eligibility" for burial in a national cemetery. 38 C.F.R. § 38.620, Note 1. In the matter at issue, they were either consulted and found him eligible or they were not consulted at all. Either way, the NCA and VBA decisions are in conflict and must be resolved.

The NCA and VBA made conflicting determinations regarding Mr. Hunt's veteran status. This conflict must be resolved for Mr. Hunt to receive his benefit – continued interment in the Massachusetts National Cemetery. For the reasons discussed above, we respectfully request that this Court keep open Mr. Hunt's case and resolve the existing conflict in favor of Mr. Hunt.
